STUDENT MINISTER SNIPPET


Everyone who knows us is all too well aware of the fact that we are going to Scotland and England for a couple of weeks. We are first to take part in a class on Celtic Christianity





BOARD SPLINTERS

The annual congregational meeting was held on Sunday, June 7.

Reports were given by the chairpersons and representatives of our church committees. The registrar reported two new members. The Administrative Committee reported that the old door was removed from the side entrance and the elevator was repaired. The Membership Committee reported that from the group discussion that took place a few weeks ago it is looking at ideas to increase membership and possible changes in church programs and services. The UU Circle reported sending out many get-well cards, flowers and gift cards this year and that it is planning a fundraiser in the fall. The Social Justice Committee reported several ongoing activities and a successful fundraiser selling T-shirts



this year. Religious education reported that the children had done several service projects this year and had learned about the many ways of prayer, including meditation, chanting and the lighting of candles as part of worship. The Spiritual Committee reported that it had overseen the ministerial schedule and the scheduling of additional speakers, changed the church signs, evaluated the music coordinator and was working on a ministerial succession plan for the year commencing 2020.

The 2015-2016 budget of \$31,600 was approved. It is \$660 more than the 2014-2015 budget.

GREEN MINUTE: YOU SAY "TABOULI," "I SAY TABBOULEH"

Whether we have a large garden or a small window box full of herbs, the fruits of our labors are starting to give us a wonderful harvest that will last right through fall. Personally, I have had a bumper crop of parsley so I found this recipe that will make delicious use of this wonderful herb. Tabouli (or Tabbouleh) is of Lebanese origin and is a vegetarian dish that is sometimes considered a salad.

- o 2 bunches fresh parsley, finely chopped
- o 6 green onions, finely chopped
- o 1 bunch of mint
- o 4 large tomatoes, finely chopped
- o Juice of 3 4 freshly squeezed lemons
- o 5 tablespoons olive oil
- o 1 cup bulgur wheat
- o 1 cup water, boiled
- o Salt and pepper to taste



- 1. Add one cup of boiled water and one cup of bulgur in a small bowl and mix. Place a towel over the bowl so the steam is unable to escape. Set aside until cool.
- 2. Finely chop the parsley, onions, mint and tomatoes, and place them into a separate large salad bowl.
- 3. Juice all the fresh lemons and pour it over the salad mixture. Add olive oil, black pepper and salt to the salad mixture. Mix well.
 - 4. Place the cool bulgur over the salad mixture and mix well.

This is obviously a recipe that you can play with and make as much or as little of it as you would like. I am not a fan of mint so I left that out but I did add feta cheese which, of course, made it no longer vegan but it gave it a wonderful flavor. Have fun and enjoy!


DINNER CARDS

CHANGES IN OUTREACH, PUBLICITY PLANNED


As everyone probably knows, efforts are underway to increase outreach and membership. Part of that will involve revamping the church website and continuing the use of social media, as well as more traditional media.

There will be a change in responsibilities for the more traditional, "old" media of newspapers, radio and television, and their affiliated websites. Tracy Kinne will submit information to these outlets.

Good candidates for traditional publicity include special events such as the recent stained-glass presentation, Voices for Worker Equality programs, the recent solar energy program, blood drives, the Renaissance holiday musical performance and the free community Christmas



dinner. Some events that coincide with major religious observances or that include other churches also have a possibility of being broadcast or printed, such as our Maundy Thursday service or community ecumenical services in which we participate at Thanksgiving or Ash Wednesday.

RALPH SINGH TO PREACH ON JULY 12

In a return to our pulpit, Ralph Singh will lead the service at 10:30 a.m. on July 12.

As chair of Wisdom Thinkers Network, Ralph has developed curricula and resources to bring an understanding of shared values into schools, religious education, and public life, using the teachings and wisdom stories from the world's spiritual traditions and cultures. He coordinates the "Inspire14!" initiative bringing Oswego County business and community leaders together with educators to help our children pass the tests of life, linking character education to the citizenship and employability soft skills needed by our youth to be successful in life.

aimed at having our talented young people stay in Oswego County and build a great future.

Ralph likes to be known as an ordinary person who continues to have extraordinary life experiences: from the powerful vision that drew him from New York to the feet of one of the world's greatest spiritual leaders, Baba Virsa Singh, in India at the age of 22, to his involvement in the community building efforts surrounding the post 9-11 arson attack on his spiritual community Gobind Sadan, USA north of Central Square.

Over the last 33 years Ralph has devoted his time to forging community and working to find ways to define civil society. He has worked in education developing and teaching a course called "Exploring Spirituality." He also helped design and name the "Schools of Character" project for the Central New York Education Consortium. In the community he has coordinated programs aimed at breaking down



barriers between the disabled and able-bodied communities, served as chair of the City County Human Rights Commission, and, together with his wife Joginder, transformed "soup-kitchens" into "community meals" to break down class barriers. Ralph also helped develop community-based farmers' markets.

Following the 1984 attack on the Golden Temple, he organized a consortium of international human rights groups to draw attention to the plight of the Sikh community in India. Through the United Nations Association (UNA), Ralph helped establish the CNYMUN (Central New York Model United Nations) at Syracuse University and served on the National Council of UNA-USA under Elliot Richardson's leadership. He developed and coordinated drug awareness programs for local schools.

Ralph helped develop the North American Interfaith Network where he is honored as a life-long honorary member, served on the advisory board of the Maxwell School's Program on Analysis and Resolution of Conflict, and served as translator for His Holiness Baba Virsa Singh for international gatherings and as his representative at major conferences including the Millennium Peace Summit. He has lectured and written on the importance of values and spirituality in modern society, and has represented the teachings of the Sikh Gurus to national and international audiences from the Smithsonian Institution to local interfaith dialogues.

He is a graduate of The Gunnery, received his degree in Japanese area studies from the University of Rochester, and maintains a lifelong study/practice of prayer and meditation and spiritual traditions.
