NOTICE OF ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The annual congregational meeting of the First Universalist Society of Central Square is scheduled to be held immediately after the worship service on Sunday morning, June 6, 2010.

The church bylaws specify that there shall be an annual congregational meeting on the first Sunday in June of each year. However, the Executive Board voted at its meeting on Sunday, May 23, to recommend to the congregation that the 2010 annual congregational meeting be postponed from Sunday, June 6, to Sunday, June 13, because many Executive Board members and committee chairs will be away on Sunday, June 6. The congregation will be asked to vote on this recommendation at the regular starting time of the annual meeting on Sunday, June 6.

GATHERING OF MEN

FLOWER COMMUNION

Andrea Abbott, student minister, will conduct a Flower Communion service at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday, June 27.

According to the Unitarian Universalist Association, the Flower Communion usually takes place in the spring. In this ceremony, members of the congregation are asked beforehand to bring a flower to the Sunday service. Upon entering the sanctuary, each person places his or her flower on the altar or in a shared vase. The flowers are blessed by the minister or congregation during the ceremony, and the sermon usually reflects upon the flowers' symbolism. At the end of the service, each person takes home a flower other than the one that he or she brought.

Reginald Zottoli wrote, "The significance of the Flower Communion is that as no two flowers are alike, so no two people are alike, yet each has a contribution to make. Together the different flowers form a beautiful bouquet. Our common bouquet would not be the same without the unique addition of each individual flower, and thus it is with our church community: it would not be the same without each and every one of us. Thus this service is a statement of our community."

The Flower Communion service was originally created in 1923 by Unitarian minister Norbert Capek, who founded the Unitarian Church in Czechoslovakia.

The service was later brought to the United States by his wife, Maya.

GREEN MINUTE (30 SECONDS THIS MONTH): QUICK TIPS TO SAVE MORE AND WASTE LESS

- Pack Litterless Lunches Purchase reusable containers for portable sandwiches and snacks.
- Spend Less Time Scrubbing Make a paste of baking soda and water to quickly remove caked-on food from pots and pans.
- Power Down Program your TV's remote to turn off other systems such as cable, satellite, DVD or VCR at the same time.
 - Skip the Dishwasher's Dry Cycle Simply allow things to air dry.
 - Cover Up Boil water faster by putting a lid on the pot.
 - Seal It In Lock the windows in your house to improve the seal and prevent leaks of hot or cool air.
- Lights Out! Pick one family member to turn off lights each time you leave home. Rotate the chore weekly or monthly.

"LEANING AGAINST THE WIND"

From 1958 to 1992 Max Coots delivered more than 1,400 sermons as minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton. In 1991 a group of UU church

members selected 59 of those sermons that they agreed were some of Max's best. First published in 1992, "Leaning Against the Wind" was re-printed twice, but for the last several years the book has been out of print. The fourth printing has just been completed and "Leaning Against the Wind" is once again available.

Max preached at our church for years after his retirement at Canton.
