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Green Minute Repair Cafes

We throw away huge amounts of stuff and a lot of it is only slightly damaged. Thus in 2009 in Amsterday Repair Cafes were born. Since then the concept has grown to many spots around the world and across the ocean to the United States.

Repair cafes are meeting places where community members can work side by side with a skilled "repair mentor" to fix broken items, for free. The mentors have all the tools, materials and knowledge to help you repair home electrical appliances, furniture, clothing, jewelry, computers, toys, and more. You can bring your broken items from home, and work with a volunteer specialist to have them repaired -- and learn how to do it yourself if they break again. Even if you don't have anything that needs repair, you can stop in to assist in repairs, or watch and learn.
