iNaturalist App



You're walking in the woods and you see a plant you've always wondered about or may-be you're at an outdoor yoga class and a butterfly lights in a shrub but you have no idea what type of butterfly it is. The butterfly sighting happened to me last summer. It turned out to be a Giant Swallowtail, which is pictured above. It took a lot of research to figure this out since the butterfly is not native to our area but I learned that we are at the northern fringe of its range. I just learned that there is an app for your phone which may have saved me the research. The app iNaturalist will give you an easy way to find out what plant or animal you have seen. You take a picture, send it off to iNaturalist.org via the app on your phone or once you've taken the picture you can send it from your computer. iNaturalist will then help you identify what species most closely resembles the photo you have taken. You will also have the information entered into a data base to help iNaturalist track where different species are appearing.

iNaturalist says: "From hikers to hunters, birders to beach-combers, the world is filled with naturalists, and many of us record what we find. What if all those observations could be shared online? You might discover someone who finds beautiful wildflowers at your favorite birding spot, or learn about the birds you see on the way to work. If enough people recorded their observations, it would be like a living record of life on Earth that scientists and land managers could use to monitor changes in biodiversity, and that anyone could use to learn more about nature." They also say, "iNaturalist made its internet debut 10 years ago in March 2008 as part of a Masters project by Ken-ichi Ueda, Jessica Kline, and Nate Agrin at the UC Berkeley School of information. Since then, it went from a website used mostly in California, to a platform with international portals, multiple languages, mobile apps for iOS and Android, and observations from every country in the world." There is a blog at the site that will put you in touch with other naturalists so you can see what they are saying and thinking as well as converse with them. This site/app appears to be a good option for anyone who wants to know more about their immediate surroundings or other places around our beautiful, diverse world. Ministerial Musings

I'm sure it's coincidence but has anyone else noticed that the day of our Stewardship Lunch is very close to Tax Day? This is said not to discourage people from pledging generously to the church. I would certainly never want to discourage that! However, the fact that the two dates were so close had me thinking about taxes and pledges. They are not the same, of course. Taxes are only indirectly voluntary. They certainly don't feel voluntary at all, but we do elect our representatives to, well, represent our wishes about how our money is spent, don't we? Don't we? Pledges are entirely voluntary. The members of the congregation give or don't give as they choose. No one is coming after anyone to put anyone in jail if they don't cough up. The congregation also votes directly on expenditures, except for very small ones, unlike how our taxes get spent, as has been noted. However, in both cases, there is a merging of resources, a sense that we can do more when we pool our funds. We can do more good when we do good together. Sometimes we may feel that our government is not really ours. I assure everyone that the church is really ours. Everyone here has a voice in how the church is run, how much we wish to put into various endeavors and how we can keep this whole enterprise going. This is kind of a roundabout way to encourage everyone not only to support the church (though that is what we hope for) but also to take part in its governance and in determining its direction. No one else can do this except ourselves. And, the Stewardship Lunch is usually pretty tasty. I hope to see everyone there.— Andrea
