You may have heard the term "Urban Tumbleweeds" when people refer to the single use plastic bags you typically get at the grocery store. They received that name due to them tumbling when they are caught by the wind then they end up stuck in trees, in ditches and in our lakes, streams and the ocean. Plastic doesn't biodegrade like paper. It breaks into smaller and smaller bits that are showing up in increasing numbers in our waterways and are being eaten by sea birds and fish. There's also evidence that microplastics are now creeping into our own food chain and can contain toxins like Bisphenol A, an endocrine disrupter.

On April 23, 2018, Governor Cumo announced a bill to ban most single use plastic bags. <u>https://www.governor.ny.gov/sites/governor.ny.gov/files/atoms/files/PlasticBagBan.pdf</u> He said that the bill comes as a result of a report released in January by a task force who studied the problem which was lead by DEC Commissioner Basil Siggos. You can find the report at <u>http://www.dec.ny.gov/docs/materials_minerals_pdf/dplasticbagreport2017.pdf</u>. It is interesting reading.

California enacted a law over a year ago banning these types of bags. The LosAngeles Times says that Californians used 13 billion less bags during the year and during their annual costal clean-up day; litter from these bags was reduced from 7.4% in 2010 to 3.1% in 2017.

Retailers like Wegmans argue that the bill could have unintended consequences since people may switch to paper bags that are heavier and use up to 90% more resources to produce and transport. Wegmans says that they feel their efforts at reducing single use plastics are working since they recycle up to 50% of the plastic bags they use and continually recommend that customers bring their own reusable bags. However, California radio station KQED says that Alameda County enacted a plastic bag ban in 2013 and in a review of the purchasing data of 69 chain stores in the county; they went from using 50 million total paper and plastic bags each year to using just 10 million. The number of paper bags used went from 13 million to 8 million, and the number of plastic bags went from 37 million to 2 million.

The Governor's bill is to take effect in January 2019. It faces a tough battle in the legislature, especially the Senate. Please contact your state representative and tell them that passage of this bill is an important step in reducing single use plastic waste.



Notable Pieces of Interest

Mythohistory is a term historians use to refer to the conventional stories that repeatedly appear in many histories and are considered as absolute truth. Yet the historic events these narratives purport to describe and understand are often distorted and false. Howard Zinn's <u>A</u><u>People's History of the United States</u> offered a challenge to the mythohistory of the US. Two more recent works give new insight into our history as a nation and our continent:

Stamped From The Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America by Ibram X. Kendi is a powerful look at how racist practices and policies have shaped all of US history from colonial times to the present. Our view of our history can never be the same after reading Kendi. I highly recommend we all read it.

When Montezuma Met Cortes: The True Story of the Meeting that Changed History by Matthew Restall examines the encounter of the Spanish with the Aztec and their allies. Restall gives a new account based on exhaustive analysis of documents, archaeology and linguistics. You can see the emergence of a new synthesis of knowledge bases in Restall's work
