#### Green Minute SLELO PRISM

I recently attended a course to become a volunteer to help the St.Lawrence Eastern Lake Ontario Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (SLELO PRISM) identify where invasive species are located in our area. They are affiliated with the Nature Conservancy and say "Detecting invasive species before their populations become too large to control gives an advantage to invasive species management strategies and increases the success potential for eradication." Among the species they are looking for are the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB), Hemlock Wooly Adelgid (HWA) and Fanwort. However, they are interested in many other species such as the Japanese Knotweed and Wild Parsnip that I have found in my area. To take action to help SELEO PRISM, as taken from their informational pamphlet, you need to:

Visit <u>www.sleloinvasives.org</u> and learn how to recognize the invasive species featured on their Prevention & Target Management Species Lists. You can join their invasive species Volunteer Surveillance Network (VSN) by emailing <u>cce-slelo-l-request@cornell.edu</u>. You may also get more details by emailing <u>megan.pistolese@tnc.org</u>.

Take a trip to your favorite landscape or water body and look for invasive species of interest.

Search for invasives where human activities or site conditions may facilitate an introduction, spread or establishment of invasives, known as Highly Probably Areas (HPAs). Boat launches, trail heads and disturbed areas are prime examples.

Report observations at <a href="www.imapinvasives.org">www.imapinvasives.org</a>. LSELO hosts annual imapinvasives trainings. To attend a training contact their office at (315) 387-7724.

By volunteering for invasive species identification and reporting I have become more aware of the plants around me whether I am taking a walk or paddling my kayak, it takes a small amount of my time and it feels good to do something to help protect our beautiful piece of the world.

#### **Religious Education**


Summer is finally here. What a great year we had.

#### **Social Justice Committee Summer Book Read**

The SJC has chosen Anthony Ray Hinton's *The Sun Does Shine* as our summer book read. It is his true story of how in 1985 he was accused of murders he did not commit even though he had a solid alibi. This book can frustrate you as you wonder how someone who could not have been at the scene could have been charged. How after easily passing a polygraph test it was not used. Also how his mother's gun that had not been used in over 20 years could have been linked to the murders. Overall you'll wonder how the Alabama justice system could have ignored the evidence and still sent him to death row. They held him there for almost 30 years before he was exonerated.

This book will also give you hope in the human spirit as Hinton recalls the unwavering love, faith and support of his beloved mother and best friend. It also tells us that our choices, even under terrible adversity, do matter and in Hinton's story he makes choices with thoughtful grace. He purposely chooses hope and takes action to give others hope. He tells his story with great appreciation for those that helped him and with forgiveness for those that did not.

Please join us in reading this important book. We'll have a discussion about it in the fall.

#### **Ministerial Musings**

The Glorious 4<sup>th</sup>! This Wednesday will ring with fireworks and be scented with the smell of bar-b-ques as we celebrate Independence Day, the beginning of our nation. We often characterize the fourth as a celebration of our freedom, the day we began the fight to be independent from Britain, from monarchy, and to found a nation that prized the freedom of the individual from tyranny. This was freedom for many but certainly not for all. As the abolitionist Frederick Douglass reminded his audience in his famous 1852 speech in Rochester What to the Slave is the Fourth of July, freedom was not extended to all. Abagail Adams had begged her husband to "remember the ladies" but they were forgotten, as were Native Americans and the poor of all sorts. At the time these exceptions to the full exercise of citizenship were not thought remarkable. We are all bound by our times and our vision.

Much later, in 1941, FDR called for us to remember that freedom is not only defined by access to the ballot box. In a speech written to urge the U.S. to enter WWII, he expanded the idea of freedom to include Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Worship, Freedom from Fear, and Freedom from Want. I have always been fond of the Norman Rockwell paintings that were inspired by this, though I wonder if those paintings would include a wider variety of subjects now. We are all bound by our times and our vision. How are we doing with defending the vision of the founders of this country? How are we doing with extending our vision to truly include those originally ignored? How are we doing with FDR's four freedoms? If we were to be able to paint like Norman Rockwell, who would we include in our paintings? What is our vision and how can we bring it to life?
