### **Green Minute Some Fall Ideas**

Fall is my favorite time of year. It's a great time to go outdoors while to temperature is still comfortable, the air is crisp and seems cleaner, and the bugs seem to have all but disappeared. It's also a great time to start a compost pile. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) says that 24% of the solid waste in landfills in this country is yard and food waste. By composting this waste then later using it to enrich your soil, you can reduce the need for water and fertilizers, even if you have a small garden or use containers.

On the colder days when you want to be indoors, it's tempting to turn up the heat. You may want to just throw on a sweater instead. According to the EPA, heating an "average" 2280 square foot home is 34% of your annual utility bill and for each degree you lower your thermostat, you can reduce your usage by 4%. It is recommended that you set your thermostat at 68 degrees or lower.

While you're turning down your thermostat, don't forget to check the thermostat on your hot water heater. Most manufacturers pre-set them at 140 degrees but by setting it to 120 degrees, you may increase the lifespan of the water heater and save 3-5% in energy costs for every 10 degree reduction in temperature.

Finally, according to the U. S. Department of Energy, sealing leaks around your house can save you from 5 to 30 percent in energy costs. Don't forget to check for drafts around windows, electrical outlets, baseboards and pipes then stop the draft by using calk, window plastic and other sealing products.

#### **UU Universe**

UUs may or may not be aware of the controversies at the UUA General Assembly surrounding publication of <u>The Gadfly Papers</u> by Reverend Todd Eklof of Spokane, Washington. Eklof was highly critical of the actions of the UUA and various groups within it involving systemic racism, gender identities and class. Eklof received much criticism including a letter of censure from the UU Ministers Association you can read <u>here</u>. There are far too many issues to go into here. I would encourage interested people to read the background as these issues affect all of us and our denomination. I would suggest reading <u>Gadfly</u> ( although paying for the book has been itself a point of contention) and also numerous pieces by people in T<u>RUUsT</u> and <u>DRU-UMM</u>.
