#### <u>Green Minute</u> <u>Does Styrofoam Ever Go Away and an Important Bill McKibben Article</u>

Styrofoam, a lightweight plastic that resists moisture which is made from polystyrene beads, was invented by the Dow Chemical Company in 1941. Since then it has had many practical uses such as flotation in boats, pipe insulation or as a packing material. The most common use is in disposable cups and containers. At the bottom of these cups and containers you will usually see the number 6. This is the symbol for polystyrene based items which are un-recyclable in most countries. If recycling options do exist, they are extremely limited, as Styrofoam can only be re-purposed back into itself or a very similar material. Currently, 2.5 million Styrofoam cups are used per year in the US.

Many environmental experts believe we should stop using Styrofoam due to the fact that recycling is extremely limited so most of it ends up in landfills. To estimate how much time it will take for unrecyclable plastics such as polystyrene to break down in a landfill, scientists use a test called a respirometry test. These tests reflect highly concentrated UV rays at different items, achieving the result that the sun and atmosphere would after days, months, or even hundreds of years. They concluded that it will take at least 500 years for this type of plastic to break down in a landfill! Landfills prolong the decomposition period due to the lack of oxygen, light, and water flow. Even when the Styrofoam breaks down into smaller pieces, these pieces are so light they can be carried by wind to waterways, which pollutes potential food sources for animals as well as humans.

We can do our part in reducing the use of these containers by pledging not to purchase these products at home and also at our church. If you're stopping for coffee while you are out and about, bring your reusable travel mug and don't forget to bring your own "doggie bag" container if you are eating in a restaurant.

On a second subject, I highly encourage you to go to <u>https://e360.yale.edu/features/the-new-climate-math-the-numbers-keep-getting-more-frightening</u> and check out the article in Yale Environment 360 by Bill McKibben that discusses how scientists keep raising the alarm that we are producing more coal, oil and gas than our planet can endure but governments around the world still aren't making any efforts to change production or consumption. The article is full of fact-based information that is both educational and terrifying but is well worth the time it will take you to read it.

## <u>Guest at Your Table</u>

(A brief history from the UU Church of Utica newsletter-ajh)

Many people have asked, what does the UUSC do and what are the Guest at Your Table boxes and envelopes for? Last Sunday, we handed out the boxes and have left boxes and envelopes on the card table at the back of the Sanctuary. The boxes will be collected on Jan. 12th and the proceeds sent to UUSC. If you set these boxes on your table for spare change, you will be surprised how this adds up! Contributions using envelopes can be sent in any time.

UUSC's work began in 1939 when Rev. Waitstill and Martha Sharp helped refugees escape Nazi persecution in Europe. They were in Czechoslovakia when Hitler's troops marched into Prague. Inspired by the many risks they took, the Unitarian Services Committee was formed in 1940. This was the precurser to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) which for 75 years has maintained a steadfast presence on the frontlines of social justice movements around the globe.

The vision of a world free of injustice where all can realize their full human rights remains their fundamental aim. This year the Guest at Your Table campaign honors four women who have been fighting for Justice in four different parts of the world:

Pelenise Alofa, organizing to help people on a small Pacific Island cope with the climate crisis

Marta Velasquez, who works to empower women and eradicate gender-based violence in Honduras

Wai Wai Nu, who was imprisoned unjustly in Burma and now fights to end discrimination toward minority religions and to promote the stories of Rohingya women

Monica Curca, who founded Activate Labs, a DC -based organization that brings art , music, and storytelling to migrants on route from Central America.
