<u>Green Minute</u> What To Do With Those Unwanted Christmas Gifts

The holidays are over and when you look at the gifts you received there may be one or more gifts that you don't have a use for. Maybe you've decided to simplify and/or eliminate the use of plastic in your home. Maybe you just don't like the color or style. Whatever the reason, here are some ideas on how to put those gifts to use.

Re-gifting isn't as taboo as it once was. Maybe the item wasn't for you but you know someone who would love it. Some folks are also organizing **mutual swaps** of presents they have received.

Charity shops like the Salvation Army, Rescue Mission or Goodwill will gladly take most items to sell in their stores but it is best to double check to see if they accept electronics, furniture etc. before you lug the item into the donation center.

Re-sale shops both brick and mortar and on the internet, may be an option for you and you can make a bit of money as well.

Shelters for both people and animals are always in need of items as small as women's personal products and as large as blankets for animal bedding. **Resettlement agencies and agencies that respond to disasters** may accept even larger items as they help people establish a new home. Again, check with the charity because there are some items they are unable to accept.

Children's and teens charities, hospitals and hospice will often accept age appropriate toys, games, music and electronics to give to people they service to help make a difficult time in their lives a bit better.

Libraries and schools will sometimes accept children's books. Some schools will accept sports equipment. If you are donating children's books, don't forget about the **little library** we have in front of the church.

Our own rummage sale in 2020 will be needing items soon so start setting things aside to donate to the sale now.


1/19 Presentation on OCO SERVICES For the Homeless
