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#### <u>Green Minute</u> Homemade Gifts For Our Furry Friends

I received the following recipes from the Oswego County Humane Society and thought I'd pass them on. Perhaps you want to do some cooking for your furry friends as a special gift for them this holiday season.

### Tuna, Pumpkin, Biscotti Cat Treats

- 1 Cup whole spelt flour (easiest on digestion)
- 1 Can low-sodium tuna in water (do not drain)
- 1 Egg
- 2 Tablespoons extra-virgin light tasting olive oil
- ½ Cup canned pumpkin

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper. Mix all ingredients in a medium bowl. Spread dough evenly on prepared pan to about 1/8 inch thickness. Score top of dough with a knife into 1 inch by ½ inch strips. Bake for 20 minutes, remove from oven and cool for 5 minutes. Flip sheet of treats; peel off paper and then bake for another 8 minutes. Turn off oven and let pan of treats sit for 1 hour to crisp up. Remove and cool completely on a wire rack. Cut into strips along scoring lines. Store in the refrigerator or freezer.

### **Oatmeal Cookie Dog Treats**

9 oz. Old fashioned oatmeal 12 oz. Whole wheat flour 1½ oz. Blueberries ½ Cup yogurt 1 Small ripe banana Cookie cutter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a backing rack with parchment paper. In a large bowl mash the blueberries and banana; add yogurt and mix together. Add oats and whole wheat flour. Knead the dough and roll it out to approximately ¼ inch thick (if the dough is a bit sticky to handle add a bit more flour). Cut with cookie cutter. Place on parchment paper and bake the treats for 30-40 minutes or until they are brown. Turn the oven off and allow the treats to cool inside the oven completely before removing.
