Since this is the beginning of a new year, I thought I'd give a little history of our important commitment to these essential blood drives. We will hold our 60th drive on Friday, January 19th so we have been supporting these drives for over 10 years! During our previous drives we have collected a total of 1158 units of blood from 1172 donors. We average 20 units of blood from each drive. These numbers show that we have truly helped our community support the life saving mission of supplying blood and blood products by the American Red Cross. Thank you for your support.

However, as I write this, we have only 11 people scheduled to give at this drive. Please tell your friends and neighbors about this drive and consider donating yourself if you can. It is highly encouraged that you schedule an appointment but walk-ins may be welcome if all appointments do not fill. You can schedule an appointment by visiting redcrossblood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS. This drive is staffed by our own First Universalist Society volunteers. If you can help, please contact me. UUA Reading Suggestion

The Spiritual Teachings of Ralph Waldo Emerson Author: Barry M. Andrews

Explores Emerson's writings, including his journals and letters, and makes them accessible to today's spiritual seekers.

Even during his lifetime, Ralph Waldo Emerson was called the Sage of Concord, a fitting title for this leader of the American Transcendentalist movement.

Everything that Emerson said and wrote directly addressed the conduct of life, and in his view, spiritual truth and understanding were the essence of religion. Unsurprisingly, he sought to rescue spirituality from decay, eschewing dry preaching and rote rituals.

UUA Through Time 1980s

As we learn more about UU history we can more clearly convey the meaning of Universalism to ourselves and others.

In 1980, two Unitarian Universalist women—Carolyn McDade and Lucile Schuck Longview—were asked to create a worship service for the Women and Religion Continental Convocation of Unitarian Universalists. As they shaped that service, McDade and Longview wanted to create a new ritual "that spoke to our connectedness to one another, to the totality of life, and to our place on this planet." They included a new, inclusive symbol of women's spirituality: water. They write, "Water is more than simply a metaphor. It is elemental and primary, calling forth feelings of awe and reverence. Acknowledging that the ocean is considered by many to be the place from which all life on our planet came—it is the womb of life—and that amniotic waters surround each of us prenatally, we now realize that [this worship service] was for us a new story of creation... We choose water as our symbol of our empowerment."

Liberating Love

Love, it sits in the chest, at least at the start.

It's what makes our heart beat again after being broken and our lungs breathe again after being closed off in the dark for far too long.

For some, it came in the form of our grandfather's eyes which saw us as carriers of something bigger and more precious and older than our little bodies disclosed.

For others, it arrived as we pressed hard against our mothers' warm skin and heard a speechless whisper say we can always come home.

We recognize love as the thing that allowed us to finally remove our masks, or that which said I don't want you to take it off, until you are ready.

We were taught love by those who arrived in the midst of our fear and shook as we shook, instead of simply trying to make our trembling stop.

But here is the secret. The inevitable awakening. The wonder that each of our lives is meant to reveal. Love doesn't just love us; it asks us to become it. That's why those metaphors of comforting quilts which wrap us in their warmth will never do. True love is always a thunderstorm that cracks us clean open so the echoes of other breaking hearts can make their way in. Yes, it wants us to be whole and strong.

But love's deepest longing is that we will use that strength to tear down the structures that leave others bloodied and bruised.

We must always remember what Selma's prophet of peace regularly preached:

Love and power are always rightly wed.

And maybe this is where the second secret comes loose. As I shake the walls to let others free,

I learn that the ones I've liberating include me.

Love takes many forms. How it shows up in our life this year is often quite different from last year. Sometimes it shifts and morphs even faster than that.

So what form is it currently taking in your life today? And what story/moment captures, not only the form it is taking, but the gift it is giving you?

For your spiritual exercise this month, spend some time trying to identify this single moment that exemplifies
